4	Aeschines of Sphettos	Philosopher, Socratic student	Loyal disciple; defends Socratic method
5	Hestines	Worker at Eleusis	Believes every citizen deserves voice; supports free expression.
6	Manythus	Young Eupatrid	Admires Socrates' intellectual courage
7	Periphon	Wealthy telônai	Personally loyal to Socrates.
8	Plasthenes	Craftsman from Kerameikos	Defends reason against superstition.
9	Argoventi	Sophist historian	Respects rational inquiry; sympathetic to Socratic ideals.
10	Parystus	Piraeus dockworker	Charismatic supporter; admires Socrates' wisdom and humor.
11	Euclid of Megara	Philopher and Socratic student	Loyal Sophist student desecending his teacher's philosophy.
12	Crito of Alopece	Close friend of Socrates and benefactor	Deeply loyal; practical defender of Socrates' moral integrity.

4	Polycrates	Athenian sophist	Rival rhetorician; jealous of Socratic fame.
5	Syriccus	Priest of Athena	Outraged by impiety.
6	Eliasthon	Zealot democrat	Sees Socrates as anti-democratic threat.
7	Hecronothes	Priest of Demeter	Religious conservative; condemns Socratic doubt.
8	Kohlephon	Trader and owner of helots	Hates philosophers' arrogance.
9	Karceres	Veteran hoplite	Blames Socrates' students (Critias, Alcibiades) for tyranny.
10	Erenthenias	Cattle rearer	Fears philosophers' elitism.
11	Theocrates	Newly enfranchised citizen	Sees Socrates as threat to equality.
